Is Mentorship Dead?

Gallup identified increasing employee engagement as one solution. But according to the annual report conducted by Leanin.org and Mckinsey and CO, 78% of companies said that managers are now expected to do more to support employee wellbeing, yet less than half of the companies provide training for managers on how to minimize employee burnout, increase engagement, and make sure promotions are equitable. How can companies increase engagement and support their managers? In this course, we explore three additional solutions to developing career development in the modern era.
